Minutes of Monthly Meeting for Business Held Fourth Month 16, 2017

At Green Street Monthly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends, held at 45 West School House Lane, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on Fourth Month 16, 2017: Business Meeting convened at 12:30 pm in prayerful silence.

17-04-01 The Clerk welcomed Friends, and thanked them for participating in today's meeting.

17-04-02 Friends reviewed and assented to the agenda.

17-04-03 Property Committee

Dan McDevitt, Clerk of the Property Committee, presented for consideration a proposal to start the design and expected implementation of four projects: 1) kitchen and basement bathroom renovation 2) ADA compliance for access to the Shoemaker Dining room 3) acoustic treatment in the dining room and 4) hearing assist.

Larry McEwan, an architect who has looked at these projects, spoke as well and supplemented the Clerk of the Property Committee's presentation.

The meeting is being asked to approve the following:

- 1. Quickly form a group of 5-8 community members who would meet intensively (at least once a week for two hours each) over the next four to six weeks, which would be tasked with interfacing with the designers as they complete their work. This group would have some decision making authority, but also be expected to report back to the meeting as consultation becomes necessary.
- 2. Approve that Larry start the survey and design phase, in order to draft documents that might eventually be used to bid the project. This would include having engineers examine the space and provide detailed proposals.

The Property Committee will be released to form the interface group and is expected to communicate clearly with the School administration, and the Meeting Trustees, as well as to present any progress and decisions to business meeting.

The Meeting approved.

17-04-04 Request for Sponsorship from Philadelphia Quarterly Meeting

Anthony DiGiovanni reported on The Shalom Center's event, "Sowing the Seeds of Transformative Leadership," which will be held on May 21st at Mishkan Shalom in Manayunk, and will honor the work of Bill McKibben, climate activist and cofounder of 350.org; Bishop Dwayne Royster, Political Director of PICO; and Sophia Wilansky a young anti-pipeline activist.

The Meeting is being asked to take one or more of these steps:

- 1. Sign on as a cosponsor and commit to helping promote the event through two emails to your list
- 2. Sponsor a young activist from our meeting for a dinner conversation with the three honorees
- 3. Publish a message in the Tribute Book

The Meeting did not support taking any of these steps.

A Friend raised a concern that we are in the process of laying down our Contributions to Others Committee, which has led to requests presently coming straight to business meeting without any prior discernment. Friends expressed that the Meeting should move to close the loop on the process

for handling the initial consideration of these types of requests. This concern will be discussed with the Clerk and brought to a future business meeting.

If a Young Friend would like to attend the event, there is a budget line to support ministry, which could be used to pay the amount requested.

Sunday, May 14, 9:00 AM, the Second Sunday Forum, Deconstructing White Fragility Co-facilitated by Cheryl McFadden and Walter Hjelt Sullivan

According to Dr. Robin DiAngelo, PhD, "White people in North America live in a social environment that protects and insulates them from race-based stress." This reality has both personal and structural impacts on the ability of white people to talk about race and to work effectively for racial and social justice in our work environments and in the larger world. The practice of white fragility also creates a dominant cultural environment that people of color have to navigate daily.

In this interactive workshop we will investigate Professor DiAngelo's model, look at the 6 social structures that she proposes support white fragility, and explore how these structures show in in our lives. We will discuss strategies for moving forward and ways that we can support each other in this work. It will be held here in the social room. *Childcare provided upon request*.

Saturday, May 20, Documentaries and Discussion Series, 6:00 PM, The Doctrine of Discovery: Unmasking the Domination Code

The Doctrine of Discovery unmasking The Domination Code "created by filmmaker Sheldon Wolfchild. This film focuses on a little known subject traced back to Christopher Columbus's so-called "discovery" of the lands now commonly known as "the Americas." The "right of discovery" was adopted and used by the U.S. Supreme Court in 1823 in the case Johnson & Graham's Lessee v. M'Intosh. The first Christian people to discover lands inhabited by non-Christians or "heathens" had asserted the "ultimate dominion" to be in themselves. On the basis of that religiously premised argument, the Supreme Court defined the land title of the Indians as a "mere right of occupancy." The Christian power that claimed "ultimate dominion" could grant away the soil while yet in the possession of "heathens." And this doctrine remains the Supreme Law of the Land in the United States.

Discussion following the documentary will be facilitated by Chief Dennis Coker (Lenape Tribe) **This event will be held at Green Street Monthly Meeting at 6:00 PM.** Free childcare, refreshments and parking are available. The event itself is also free.
